

New Faculty Masters for DuBois and Van Pelt College Houses

On the recommendation of the Penn House System's faculty and student selection committee, the Provost has appointed two new College House Faculty Masters for three-year terms. Dr. Richard Sims for the W. E. B. DuBois College House, and Dr. Marco Frascari for the Van Pelt College House. He also reappointed Dr. Peter Steiner as master of the Modern Languages College House, and Dr. Karl F. Otto, Jr. as master of Stouffer College House, and named acting masters for Hill College House and Ware College House.

Dr. Richard Sims, assistant professor of medicine in the School of Medicine, teaches general internal medicine, geriatrics and clinical epidemiology. His research focuses on epidemiology and infectious diseases in elderly and minority populations.

Dr. Marco Frascari, associate professor and associate chair of the Ph.D. program in architecture, School of Arts and Sciences, teaches courses in architectural theory, design and drawing. His book, The Monsters of Architecture was published in 1991 by Rowan and Littlefield, and he is now completing a book entitled *Under the* Sign of Wonder. Dr. Frascari has recently been selected as a consultant for the restoration of the church of Santa Andrea in Mantua, Italy.

Dr. Peter Steiner, associate professor and chair of Slavic languages, School of Arts and Sciences, teaches undergraduate courses in nineteenth and twentieth century Russian literature, and publishes on Slavic literary theory. His book, Russian Formalism: Meta Poetics, has just been translated into Italian.

Dr. Karl Otto, professor and undergraduate chair of Germanic languages, School of Arts and Sciences, teaches literature in the German and comparative literature departments. Dr. Otto is very active in the Oral Proficiency Movement and publishes articles on seventeenth century German literature, especially on language and literature societies and their members.

Dr. Herman Beavers, assistant professor of English, will stand in at Hill College House for Dr. Robert Lucid, who is on leave this year.

Dr. Jan van der Spiegel, Class of 1940 Term Associate Professor of Electrical Engineering and director of the Center for Sensor Technologies, will fill in at Ware College House while Dr. Sol Katz, professor of pediatric dentistry and director of the Krogman Growth Center, is on leave

A Time for Others

Among the items that has not floated to the top of our agenda this year has been the University's workplace charitable campaign. The debate about what form the campaign would take has faded following the success of Penn's Way '92. We are in the middle of Penn's Way '93, and the first half indicators are not rosy.

The campaign's success, like so much of what we do, has to be reinvented regularly. The needs of many of our neighbors do not go away. More men, women and children will request help from the many Delaware Valley nonprofit agencies offering health, human and educational services than ever before. Our economy remains sluggish, everyone has problems at home, and there is a quiet fear that such chronic problems as homelessness, substance abuse, child neglect and AIDS may be problems for which we cannot provide answers.

The antidote to helplessness is action. I am particularly proud of the many members of the Penn community who volunteer their time, effort and commitment for the benefit of others. But even those of us who have few hours to give can become involved through participation in the Penn's Way campaign.

Please take a moment to examine the work of the 16 partner organizations represented in Penn's Way '93. Consider giving your support for one or more of these organizations who are there to do what we as individuals cannot—improving the quality of life for people who may be our neighbors, or for people whom many of us will never know.

The lounges in the High Rises, the sixth and seventh floors of the Franklin Building and the upper reaches of the Penn Tower Hotel are all good vantage points for viewing the city's skyline. The jagged outline of its buildings against the horizon always remind me of our city's variety, complexity and size. Far more than its structures, Philadelphia is its people. In many ways, Penn's people are also Philadelphians. For your willingness to extend yourselves to your fellow citizens, you have my thanks. I know that you have theirs as well.

IRS Mandatory Pension Withholding: Effective January 1, 1993

The Unemployment Compensation Amendments of 1992 (UCA) enacted on January 3, 1992 and effective January 1, 1993, make *four* significant changes to the treatment of distributions from qualified retirement plans as follows:

- 1. Expands the types of distribution eligible for rollover treatment.
- Requires plans to provide participants with the option to direct that distributions be paid directly to another qualified plan or IRA.
- 3. Requires a written explanation to participants of the availability of the direct rollover option and the rules concerning income tax withholding, rollovers and other special tax treatment that may apply.
- 4. Changes the withholding requirements to impose a 20% mandatory withholding on the taxable portion of an eligible rollover distribution.

Effective January 1, 1993, any "eligible rollover distribution" may be rolled over. An eligible distribution is any distribution from a qualified plan or tax-sheltered annuity arrangement except (1) an annuity, (2) a distribution under an installment payout of ten years or more, (3) any portion of the distribution that is not includible in gross income (e.g. after-tax employee contributions), (4) a distribution that is required under the IRS Code's minimum distribution rules after the employee attains 70-1/2 or dies, and (5) corrective distributions necessary to meet plan qualification requirements.

Notice Requirements

- If you are currently enrolled in the Tax-Deferred Annuity plan, the carrier from which you request a distribution will provide you with notice of the new withholding rules regarding your distribution.
- If you are a participant in the Retirement Allowance plan who is eligible for a lump sum payment at termination (of \$3500 or less), the Benefits Office will provide you with notice of the new withholding rules prior to the distribution.

Important: If you are considering a distribution before the end of the calendar year 1992, you may be eligible for consideration under the old rules if you apply before December 15, 1992. The old rules do not impose 20% mandatory withholding.

Call for Input on AIDS Policies

The Policy Committee of the University HIV/AIDS Task Force invites commentary from members of the Penn community on the University's policies regarding HIV/AIDS, including relevant personnel policies, and their experiences with those policies or with gaps in policy. Such comments will enhance the Policy Committee's efforts to pull together and assess current policies and to help the University move forward in areas in which the need for change is suggested.

The HIV/AIDS Task Force was convened by the Vice Provost for University Life and charged with responsibility "for developing strategies and services which address the prevention and response to the growing incidence of HIV/AIDS infection within the campus community." Through its committees on education, policy, and services, the Task Force is considering policies, procedures and interventions which affect students, faculty, staff, and their families, and examining effective strategies for information dissemination, education, and service delivery for HIV/AIDS-related problems. Results of the Task Force's work and its recommendations will be conveyed to campus academic and administrative leaders and to the general Penn community.

All members of the University community are invited to speak with the Policy Committee at two public meetings: *Thursday, December 3*, 4-5:30 p.m., in the Harrison Room in Houston Hall, and *Friday, December 4*, noon-1 p.m. in Room 305 Houston Hall.

Linda Bowen Santoro, 45, marketing and public relations coordinator of the College of General Studies, died November 26 of cancer.

Ms. Santoro came to Penn in 1987 as an undergraduate in CGS. She was the first recipient of the Bread Upon the Waters scholarship, an award that allows women over 30 to complete their college degrees. She was scheduled to graduate from Penn this May.

Before coming to Penn, Ms. Santoro held many positions including the first woman apprenticeship in Local 2 of the International Typographical Union. She also worked as a reporter for and, later, as editorial page editor of the *Northeast Times*. In 1986, she served as state press secretary for Hands Across America, a campaign to end hunger and homelessness.

Ms. Santoro was instrumental in organizing CGS's 100th anniversary last spring.

She is survived by her parents, Jane and Joseph Bowen, and a sister, Andra Boos.


